

The Flight of The Eagle (Le Vol de l'Aigle): English errata as of January 28, 2006.**Corrections to units:**

1. Platov's Cossacks, from Bagration's corps, are present in the Friedland scenario; but not in the Eylau scenario.
2. Vandamme's infantry division (Wurtemburg, VIII corps in 1809) has a morale value of 25, not 35.
3. Von Arnim division (Prussian, in 1806) has an effective value of 9, of which none are cavalry (and not 7 and 5, respectively).

Corrections to maps:

1806: The only primary river is the Elbe, in the north of the map.

1807: The only two primary rivers are the Niemen and the Vistula.

Corrections to the player's files:

Prussian 1806:

- The scenario starts on the 10th of October, not September.

French 1806:

- The scenario starts on the 10th of October, not September.
- Mortier's corps is still in training in Mayence and is not involved in this campaign.

Russian 1807:

- Line of communication: Bialystock is just off the map, to the East at the level of Tykoczyn (in the southernmost third of the map).
- Weather effects: the Prussians use the values of the Russian army.

French 1807:

- Line of communication: Thorn is just off the map, to the West, in the loop made by the Vistula out of the map.

Austrians 1809:

- The pontoon train allocated to Charles can be deployed with any corps HQ at the beginning of the scenario. The Austrian player tells the Umpire which corps HQ has the pontoon train.

French 1809:

- Oudinot leads the cuirassiers division of Espagne, Davout leads the St. Sulpice division, and Vandamme leads the Nansouty division.

Corrections to the Umpire's rules:

- Page 9 : (A) The strategic value of a leader must take into account any artillery unit deployed in a battle. (B) Regarding the organization of a corps, only the overall commander can change the allocation of a division to a corps commander, by attaching it to another player, for example. A corps leader can not make these changes by themselves.

(C) Correction about a commander and his HQ: A commander can decide to move alone, without his HQ, he then moves at the speed of an aide de camp, i.e., 10 km/h. This can happen if a player decides to ride to meet another player. In this case, his HQ obviously does not follow him. In the 1809 scenario, Napoleon, as well as Lannes, arrive during the campaign. They can use the 10km/h speed toward a selected destination told to the Umpire. After Napoleon gets to this destination, it becomes the GHQ, which moves at a speed of 5 km/h.

(D) As a general rule, a commander can write a message only when present with his HQ.

-Page 11: Results 1 to 3 : roll two dice, not one, on the table indicated above in the text.

- Page 16, Battles: The battle zone is a 5 km by 5 km square. When a unit totally enters this zone it is then allocated to the player's reserve (in his hand) and can be deployed in the battle.

- Page 18 : Regarding "the combat is mandatory in the three sectors once the battle has started." There is some flexibility here. For example, at Austerlitz Soult launched his attack at 8 am, while Lannes launched it later. At Waterloo, d'Erlon waited for a while before starting his attack. On the other hand, other battles started in every sector at the same time: Wagram, Friedland, and Jena. If both players do not want to engage in a sector, this is allowed. They each simply do not deploy any unit face down during the set up. This non-engagement works only if both players do not deploy any unit in a sector. If one player deploys a unit in a sector, the other player must do the same; otherwise the latter simply loses that sector.

- Page 19, following the first column. Correction concerning the coming of a corps during a battle and the neutralization of a sector occupied by the enemy: The rules say that a lost combat sector cannot be contested by other units coming from the reserve. This is true, but if a new corps arrives in the area during the battle, the new corps units can engage the enemy units in the lost sector. This creates a new battle sector, located "behind" the lost sector. A new combat resumes there, and this contested sector gives only one bonus dice to the neighbouring sector, instead of two (it is still a threat to the neighbour, but less direct). If this new combat is won two consecutive rounds by the new incoming corps, the advantage is lost for the former winner and the incoming corps can reoccupy the sector. Moreover, this new combat can be reinforced by the former winner, by units coming directly from his reserve. (There is no need to deploy first in his sector, and then move into the won sector.)
